Dear Members of Holy Trinity,

"25 Days of Christmas?" you might be asking. The way that I always heard, it was "The 12 Days of Christmas." So, where did this come from? Let me explain.

When I went away to high school as a 14 year-old, my mom started a tradition that she would continue with the rest of her kids and grandkids. Each year, on December 1st, a package would arrive with 25 small gifts inside. They were numbered 1-25, one to open on each day until I arrived home at Christmas.

This "25 Days of Christmas" was something which I looked forward to each year. And it wasn't necessarily because of the gift. Mostly I looked forward to it because I understood the time and thought that my mom put into each of the gifts; she wasn't just going to the dollar store and buying 25 random little presents.

Every single gift had special significance behind it; whether it be a little treat that she knew I loved or providing a little preview of what I might be getting for Christmas. Often times, I

had to figure out why the gift was special, but each one always was, in some way or another.

The "25 Days of Christmas" was really 25 days that showed how much my mom thought about me, so it was special.

At a time of year when we often think about our own wish lists for Christmas and give much thought to what we might give to those in our life who are special to us, it can be easy to forget about what God has given to us.

So, we present the 25 Days of Christmas to you – an opportunity (25 of them, actually) to think about specific ways in which God gives to you through your church, Holy Trinity.

I hope that you will make the 25 Days of Christmas a special way for you to show your Savior that you are thinking of him each day during this time when we are getting ready to celebrate his birth. And while we are hopeful that it will have a positive impact on our ministry here at Holy Trinity, I pray that it helps you to keep your focus during this special Christmas season.

Devotional thought for the month...

Just wait

When my son turned five, he started calling the "Happy Birthday" song "the waiting song." When we asked him why, he said resignedly, "It's the song that has to be sung while you're waiting to eat cake and ice cream and open presents."

A few moments can seem like an eternity when we're waiting for something special. Can you imagine what it's like to wait for thousands of years?

God's people waited

"He will crush your head" (Genesis 3:15), Adam and Eve heard God say to the serpent in the Garden of Eden. That promise was all that Adam and Eve had to cling to. They died spiritually when they tasted the forbid-

den fruit. They felt God's fury upon their disobedience. God's promise that the deceiver would be crushed offered the only glimmer of hope.

Thus began the wait for a promise to be fulfilled.

Adam lived out his life, watching and waiting-for 930 years. As he felt his onceperfect body age and deteriorate, he ached to see the promise fulfilled. But the serpentcrusher didn't come.

The violence and wickedness of the generations after Adam increased, but a tiny remnant remembered God and clung to the promise. The wait continued.

Centuries of waiting turned into millennia. Great empires arose and crumbled. Peace and prosperity gave way again and again to the horrors of war, famine, and plague. Kings and conquerors ruled and returned to dust.

God's people shared the prophecy

Through it all, God's faithful few passed down the promise of a Savior. Around campfires and at evening meals, during Sabbath rests and while working in the fields, fathers told their sons, mothers taught their daughters that there was hope for all who were waiting for God's deliverance.

As centuries passed, God shared details about how and where the Deliverer would come:

- His conception and birth were to be miraculous: "The virgin will be with child and will give birth to a son, and will call him Immanuel" (Isaiah 7:14).
- Judah, son of Israel, would be his ancestor: "The scepter will not depart from Judah...until he comes to whom it belongs" (Genesis 49:10).
- The City of David was chosen as his birthplace: "Bethlehem Ephrathah...out of you will come from me one who will be ruler over Israel" (Micah 5:2).
- The seat of his ministry was to be the shores of the Sea of Galilee: "He will honor Galilee of the Gentiles, by the way of the sea, along the Jordan" (Isaiah 9:1).

God's prophets also pointed to what the Deliverer would do:

- The Messiah, or Chosen One, was to take upon himself the punishment that we sinners deserve: "He was pierced for our transgressions, he was crushed for our iniquities" (Isaiah 53:5).
- His perfect obedience would be credited to sinners as righteousness: "This is the name by which it will be called: The Lord Our Righteousness" (Jeremiah 44:16).
- He would die a horrible death: "My God, my God, why have you forsaken me?" (Psalm 22:1).
- Death would not be able to hold him: "You will not abandon me to the grave, nor will you let your Holy One see decay" (Psalm 16:10).

Who knows how many generations were born, lived, watched, prayed, and died waiting for a fulfillment that they saw only with eyes of faith?

Only when the stage was perfectly set, when the time had fully come, did the waiting end-when God revealed his present to the world.



Christmas presents a prime opportunity for Christian people. Since Christmas is such a celebrated holiday in our country, with so many traditions and festivities tied to it, most people that you know likely have an affinity for this "most wonderful time of the year." Use that to your benefit as you seek to carry out your Savior's commission to tell others about him and what he has done for the world.

There are a number of ways for you to show people that Christmas is wonderful because the Savior came into the world.

- * Use a postcard to invite a FRAN to our Christmas services—A FRAN is a Friend, Relative, Acquaintance, or Neighbor. These are the people that God has brought into your life so that you might share your Savior with them. Every person that you meet should be someone that you look at as a prospect. In the beginning of December, you will find postcards in your church mailboxes. Send them to someone that you would like to have sitting next to you on Christmas Eve! Far and away, unchurched people are more likely to accept an invitation to a Christmas service more than any other.
- * Volunteer for Christmas for Kids—This one-day Bible school event will take place on December 12th from 9am-Noon. What could be better than showing children the real reason for Christmas joy! Check out the blurb on the next page for more info.
- * Invite a child to Christmas for Kids (ages 3-10)—Postcards are in the back of church. Have a neighbor with kids? A grandchild that you've been trying to get to church? A co-worker who's always looking for something to do with their kids? Give them an invite!

- * Join us for caroling—We'll be headed to a couple local senior living centers in December (TBA) to bring the glad tidings of Christmas to those who might not be able to make it to church. If you've never seen the smile on the face of an elderly person as you sing about Christ's birth to them, it is something you need to experience. Choir voices are not needed, only a joyful heart!
- * Live with Christmas Joy—Perhaps the easiest thing that you can do during this time of year when deadlines and hectic-ness seem to bring angst, and even anger, into so many lives is to let the joy of Christmas shine in your lives. You can do it in small ways. Here's an example: At the post office and the person behind you is flustered and frustrated... Offer them your spot with a smile. Someone will notice.

Each year, Christ presents a gift-wrapped opportunity to share him with others. Make it a goal to use that gift during this Christmas season!
